



Thank you very much for agreeing to write a book review for the *Journal of Australian, Canadian, and Aotearoa New Zealand Studies (JACANZS)* ☺ It will be great to receive your review within **eight weeks** after you receive your copy of the book as a **Word document**. Reviews should be **500-750 words** in length. In terms of format, it would be good if your review could use **Arial font, size 12**, and be **single-spaced**. Direct quotations from the book that you are reviewing should be kept at a minimum, and where included should use ‘ ‘ and “ “ for any quotes within quotes, and have the page number directly following in brackets, i.e. (p. 5). The book details at the top of the review should be in the format of the following examples:

JACANZS now also accepts **reflective reviews**. These are reviews in which the chosen book lends itself to deeper contemplation in terms of issues of concern in academia or connections to current events among other topics etc. For an example of what this kind of review might look like please see [Māmari Stephens' review of *Protest Tautohe: Objects of Persistence, Resistance and Defiance*](#). These reviews follow the same general formatting guidelines as above, except they can be **1000-1500 words** in length. We ask that reflective reviews be submitted within **twelve weeks** after you receive your copy of the book.
